



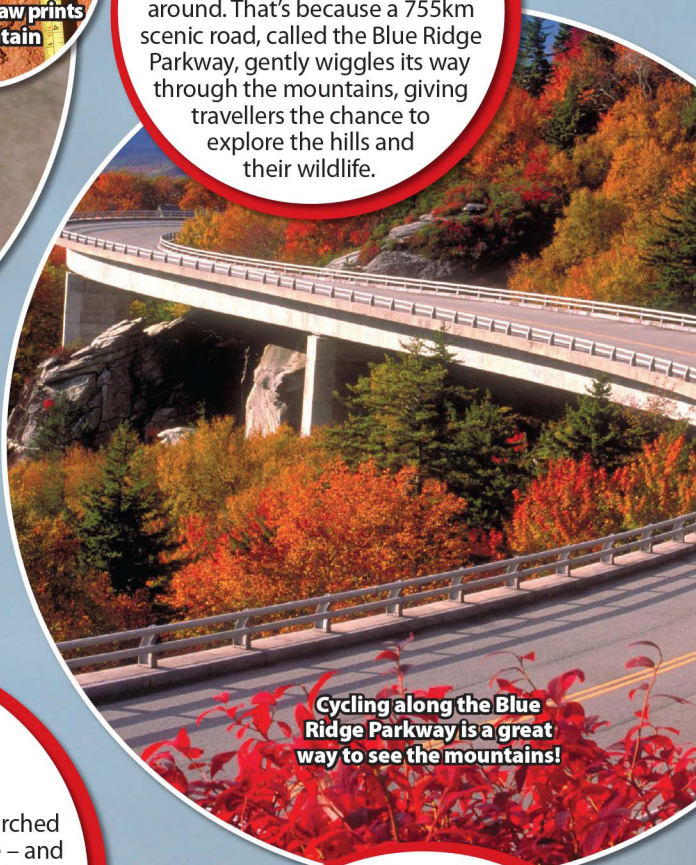
If you hear a roar coming from the hills, watch out – mountain lions could be prowling about! Park rangers say that they haven't lived here for years, but many local people believe otherwise. "We've heard the roar of mountain lions on several occasions," says Chip Balduf, who's also taken photos of mysterious tracks on his property.

Blowing Rock (below) is a cliff perched 1,000m above a deep river gorge – and it's the only place in the world where the snow is said to fall *upside down!* The rocky walls of the gorge form a funnel, and as the wind sweeps through, any light objects that fall from the cliff are blown back up towards the sky – including the snow. Wow!

This amazing land may be wild but it's actually really easy to get around. That's because a 755km scenic road, called the Blue Ridge Parkway, gently wiggles its way through the mountains, giving travellers the chance to explore the hills and their wildlife.

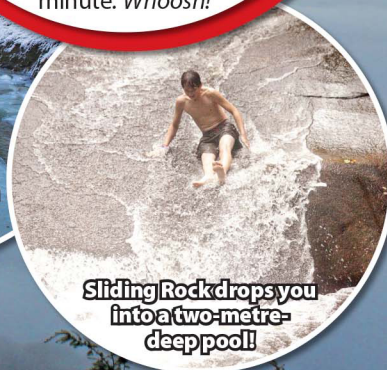


Cycling along the Blue Ridge Parkway is a great way to see the mountains!

Transylvania County is the wettest place in the whole of the USA, drenched in nearly 230cm of rain each year! It's also home to a whopping 250 waterfalls, like Looking Glass Falls and Sliding Rock, which is a huge sloping boulder in the Pisgah National Forest. People can slide down 20m of smooth stone, thanks to the 42,000 litres of water that rush over the boulder every minute. *Whoosh!*

Check out these other famous mountains from around the world...

Everest, on the border of Nepal and Tibet, is the highest mountain on Earth. Towering at a colossal 8,850m, Mount Everest was formed about 50-60 million years ago.

The highest mountain in the British Isles, Ben Nevis is in the Scottish Highlands. It was formed 40 million years ago and is 1,344m high.

This mountain, the highest in Africa at 5,892m, is actually a volcano. It's a baby in comparison to the mountains in the Blue Ridge – it started life (first erupted) just two million years ago.
